a. City

Barkhau said that ALFA did meet with BAE Systems which was a company that put together the first fuel cell powered ferry in San Francisco, California.

# C. Working Groups

a. Federal policies to support/endorse and grant opportunities Riley gave a briefing on the reconciliation package negotiations that was still at a federal level. Will report a later time as the bills progress. Barkhau spoke about a carbon fee and rebate program.

b. Climate action approaches in Sitka

Barkhau reported on the presentation that was done by Zahn. He said a draft report was on composting. Spoke about a solid waste composting program for the community. He thought this would be more of a long-term goal to start working on. Borneman said she was working on a report on projected climate impacts that would give city employees or other interested community members what Sitka would look like at 2015 or what will it look like at 2075, and how these impacts would impact city infrastructure such as buildings, roads, or the airport. The report would be accessible information for all.

Chair Bagley reported that member Gear will be starting to research and document on Greenhouse Gas Emissions inventory.

He briefed the commission on a seawater sourced heat pump district heating system, what heat exchangers look like for BTES boreholes, and about a seawater-source heat pump combined with borehole heat storage.
