14.10.040 Commercial recreational use permit fees.

The applicant for a commercial recreational use permit shall pay a fee established by the city and borough assembly that will give the city and borough a fair and reasonable return in light of the cost of administering the activity permitted under the permit, the impact of the proposed activity on the area, the cost of any improvements required, and the value of the benefit conferred upon the user. The fee shall be paid prior to the commencement of the permitted activity and should be based on the applicant's best estimate of the number of clients and number of days of permitted activity that he/she expects for that season. Reconciliation is done at the end of the season and can result in a credit being carried over to the following season or additional charges. The minimum fee is \$100.00, regardless of whether a commercial operator's service days add up to that amount. (Ord. 06-14 § 4, 2006; Ord. 04-39 § 4, 2004; S.G.C. § 23.20.040.)

The Sitka General Code is current through Ordinance 24-04, passed February 13, 2024.

a. Location and explanation of proposed use, including maps.

Baranof Warm Springs- walking on boat ramp and boardwalk with access to bathhouse, lake and grotto —avoiding adjacent private lands.



Goddard Hot Springs city lands – walking on trails/boardwalks to bathhouses – continuing onto USFS lands (permitted) and avoiding adjacent private lands.



b. Description of transportation to site, including mode of transportation and plan for client parking.

Transportation and accommodation is via charter sailboat.

c. Estimate number of participants and/or group size.

In 2024, projected use is approximately 1-4 trips at the CBS recreation sites for 1 day each. Group size is typically 2-6 clients with 1 or 2 guides.

d. Time of desired usage.

Trips include day-use and an overnight at the dock, or at anchor, from the middle of May to the middle of September.

e. Plans for restroom accommodations, litter control, emergency evacuation, & clientele safety briefing.

Restrooms are provided aboard S/V BOB equipped with macerating toilets and holding tanks. All trash generated is collected, sorted, and stored aboard S/V BOB for off-site recycling and/disposal in our final destination community (Juneau, Sitka, or Petersburg). Emergency evacuation plan includes charter float plane, or boat charter, or Coast Guard involvement. We carry a satellite phone/messenger, EPIRB, VHF Radios, and cell phones for communication. We also carry an extensive first-aid kit and AED device aboard.

Safety briefing and orientation is required by US Coast Guard and other permits and is done in our departure dock at the beginning of the trip. Additionally, a bear-awareness briefing is done on the first shore excursion - before setting out. Guides and clients carry bear-spray. Food is typically not carried off the vessel.

f. Training requirements for personnel conducting transport and tour activities.

Captain is USCG Master 50-ton with Sail Endorsement. He and crew are trained and certified in First Aid/CPR/AED. Both are certified by AMSEA as Fishing Vessel Emergency Drill Instructors. Both have extensive bear safety training. The vessel S/V BOB is 5-Star certified by USCG. Crew are trained in man-overboard, skiff deployment, firefighting, and emergency communications. Sound Sailing holds a special use permit for Tongass National Forest and designated hiking routes as well as an Alaska State Parks Permit. We also have a NPS commercial permit and operate trips in Glacier Bay. This is our 9th season providing charter vessel services to these areas.

g. Schedule of fees/charges to clients and a description of any collection, disbursement, royalty, commission or similar arrangements with other tour brokers, agents or cruise ship companies.

Typical full-priced 7-day trip cost \$3950 per person. Sitka residents are given 10% discounts.

Booking agents are paid a 10% commission.

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





ATTACHMENT A: Description of operations

(a) Location and explanation of proposed use, including maps

Company mother vessels are U.S. Coast Guard inspected overnight passenger vessels approximately 150' in length. Each vessel typically carries between 20 and 24 passengers. Baranof Warm Springs is located along the route which the two mother vessels follow during week-long cruises between Sitka and Juneau. Occasionally, clients will be offered the opportunity to visit the bay and use the boardwalk primarily for a short hike to the eastern shores of Baranof Lake or to access the warm spring pools. A map is provided as Attachment C.

(b) Description of transportation to site, including mode of transportation and plan for client parking.

Clients will be dropped off at the main dock by 19' skiffs operated by licensed captains. Skiffs will be dispatched from a mother vessel anchored some distance away. Occasionally, one or more skiffs will remain tied alongside the float for short periods of time while clients are ashore.

(c) Estimate number of participants and/or group size

The maximum total annual combined client and guide use of the boardwalk over the course of the season from May to September would be 640 persons if each vessel visited Baranof Warm Springs each week of operation. Actual recent use is much lower and ranged between 60 and 200 clients. Upon first arrival ashore, group sizes will generally range from 10 to 20 persons including guides, but clients tend to proceed in smaller groups. Typically our guests have different fitness levels and often disperse in groups of 5 with one guide per group.

(d) Time of desired usage

Duration of a visit ashore will generally be less than two hours and typically be daylight hours between 9:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. The Boat Company does not set its itinerary until the beginning of a trip because captains and crew tailor activities to each client group each week. The maximum number of days during which visits are expected to

occur is 32 days. Current use patterns indicate that actual use will be between 8 and 16 days – one vessel every other week or less. Because of The Boat Company's cruise routes, client visits ashore almost always occur on a Tuesday, Wednesday or Thursday. The Boat Company's 2024 operating season will begin May 13 and end September 9.

(e) Plans for restroom accommodations, litter control, emergency evacuation, & clientele safety briefing

Visits will be of short duration and will not require restroom accommodations ashore. Skiffs and skiff captains will be available at any time to shuttle clients back to the mother vessel and onboard restroom accommodations.

The Company operates under "Leave No Trace" guidelines and guides and clients will be instructed to carry out all refuse.

Plans for emergency evacuation and clientele safety briefing are included in Attachment B, Safety Plan.

ATTACHMENT B: SAFETY PLAN FOR OFF-VESSEL ACTIVITIES / SHORE EXCURSIONS

First Aid, Safety & Emergency Training

All skiff operators have a U.S. Coast Guard license. All crew members are certified in CPR and First Aid. During pre-season training and orientation, all crew members attend an on-board 1st Aid/CPR training course, including instruction on avoiding/treating hypothermia. Many crew members have prior training and experience considered in the development of emergency response strategies. The Boat Company seeks to place at least one individual on board each vessel who has receive a higher level of training than 1st Aid/CPR, such as Wilderness First Responder or Wilderness EMT.

Pre-season training in normal Southeast Alaska operating areas includes opportunities for both on-shore and on-the-water orientation. Videos and other instructional materials will be provided and all guides are expected to familiarize (or re-familiarize) themselves with, at minimum, the following safety-related subjects: bear safety, trail/off-trail hazards, skiff handling with passengers, safe approach distance to tidewater glaciers, noxious/poisonous plant identification, punctures/infections from handling fish, basic kayaking competence, hand-held radio communication procedures and weather preparedness.

MIST COVE and LISERON are USCG inspected passenger vessels. Licensed officers and crew are required by Federal law to regularly conduct emergency training and drills for fire, man overboard, abandon ship and response to distress calls. Federal regulations require that Captains file a detailed report on each drill in the ship's Logbook upon completion of the drill or training exercise. Vessel Logbooks shall be periodically reviewed in-season by a senior company employee and checked for compliance with safety regulations.

Emergency Survival Supplies

- 1) Emergency survival supplies on each mother vessel are stipulated by their unique USCG Certificate of Inspection and shall include at minimum:
 - Life Rafts, inspected annually, with contents and auto-release per regulation
 - EPIRB (Emergency Position Indicator Radio Beacon), with auto-release
 - Flares, unexpired, per regulation
 - Fire Extinguishers, regularly inspected, per regulation
 - Life Vests, approved and in sufficient numbers/sizes, per regulation
 - Life Rings, throwable, two with emergency lights & lines, per regulation
- 2) Emergency supplies in skiffs shall include at minimum:
 - Flares, unexpired, per regulation
 - Fire Extinguishers, per regulation
 - Air Horn or other suitable noisemaker, per regulation
 - Ditch Kit including bottled drinking water, matches, toilet paper, flashlight, first aid manual
- 3) Emergency supplies in guide packs shall include at minimum:
 - Bottled Water
 - Med Kit
 - Flashlight
 - 1 or 2 large heavy gauge trash bags

Communications Equipment and lost/overdue party procedures

Guides each have individual hand-held VHF radios, with batteries recharged each night if necessary. A VHF radio watch shall be maintained on board motherships at all times with scheduled check-ins whenever parties are out in skiffs or on shore. Guides conduct their activities in such a way as to remain in reasonably regular contact with other guides and/or with mother vessels. VHFs are also permanently mounted in all skiffs. Skiff radio output power is much greater than hand-held radio output power, so guides on shore also can relay communications through skiff operators in order to stay in touch with mother vessels. Each mother vessel also has a hand-held satellite telephone for use in emergencies.

If a group in a skiff or group on shore becomes disoriented and lost, but is otherwise safe and in VHF contact with the mother vessel, then the Captain must be immediately notified and take action to locate the party. As long as VHF contact is maintained, and the party is safe, the Captain shall have the discretion to choose a proper response

strategy. If outside assistance is mobilized (i.e., US Coast Guard or local Search and Rescue Units) then senior company officials must be immediately contacted. If a group in a skiff or on shore fails to return to the mother vessel at the expected time and/or fails to respond to VHF radio calls, then the Captain will respond as previously described, but must contact senior company officials immediately via satphone, cell phone or any other available means. In any instance where the safety of a lost/overdue group is not known, the assumption is that the group is at risk and onshore company officials must be informed and assist with implementation of a crisis communications plan.

Client Briefing and Bear Safety

Naturalists provide guests with an onboard bear presentation prior to the first shoregoing activity of a cruise. Guides repeat the bear safety protocol when landing groups ashore in bear country. Guides keep groups together on trails, remain in the lead, watch for bear signs and never allow groups to string-out excessively along trails. Ecotour operators prefer to avoid bears during hiking, fishing and beachcombing activities and there is constant communication in the field about where bears are and are not present. Each guide carries an air horn and two cans of bear spray but do not carry firearms. There is always a "standby" skiff maintaining radio communications with onshore groups and available to shuttle a group away from an area when guides observe the presence of bears during onshore activities.

Bear safety practices also refer to keeping bears safe. Bear viewing opportunities are opportunistic and provided while on saltwater from a skiff or mothership using binoculars. Guides follow responsible bear viewing guidelines at all times. We avoid activities particularly in areas where bears are not habituated to people out of sensitivity to foraging bear needs for space along a grass flats or in a salmon stream. When a bear becomes aware of a group's presence, guides observe its behavior for signs of anxiety or irritation. If a bear approaches, it may be either curious or aggravated and the guide's response will be to yield to the bear and gradually (but decisively) move the group away from the area. Guides observing any aggressive or unusual bear behavior report to the vessel Captain, who shares the information with the other vessel Captain and other tour operators. If the behavior is extreme senior company officials will report the encounter to the US Forest Service and ADF&G. The Boat Company's management and guides review and adhere to bear safety guidelines, including safe viewing procedures set forth in the Brown Bear Management Strategy:

- Always remain far enough away from the bear so that your presence, if noticed, does not
 affect the animal's behavior. The distance bears normally react to human presence is
 typically much greater than people assume. Use binoculars, spotting scopes, or other
 telescopic lenses to improve your view.
- Bears are wild animals and you are viewing them in a remote area. Be prepared. Review current agency information and brochures on protection and how to deal with close encounters.
- Always select a viewing position that does not make you vulnerable to a surprise approach by a bear.
- Never directly approach a bear.
- Avoid situations where your presence could startle a bear.
- Avoid viewing from obvious bear trails.
- Never allow bears access to human foods.
- There is safety in numbers, stay with your group.
- If seen by a bear, avoid moving. Even minor movements will encourage wary bears to leave.

- Never use a motorized vehicle or boat to try getting close to a bear.
- Never run from an approaching bear; if you move away do it in a slow, deliberate manner.
- Show respect and courtesy to other bear viewers. Conduct your viewing in a way that doesn't detract from their experience. Don't mix booze with bears.
- Think wind, wind, wind. When possible always approach bears, or areas where bears are likely to be, from downwind.
- The best bear viewing is usually in the early morning or evening. Shoreline viewing is usually better during low tides.
- Small groups are less likely to disturb bears and so more likely to have better viewing.

Boating Safety

All crew members exercise diligence in keeping themselves and their guests out of harm's way while on shore or out fishing. Routine safety precautions include, at minimum, the following:

Life Jackets

US Coast Guard approved Type 1 Personal Flotation Devices are stowed in each guest's staterooms and in deck lockers on each mother vessel for use in emergencies. More comfortable Type 3 life jackets in a full range of sizes are provided for use during normal off-vessel activities.

Guides and guests must wear life jackets at all times when off-vessel and on-the-water. Guides may substitute float-coats or CO₂-inflatable vests according to preference. Each mother vessel's boarding and disembarking area is the boundary line beyond which life jackets are required. Life jackets may be removed only when a kayak or skiff is safely touching shore, or only when a guide/guest is safely back onboard the mother vessel. Flotation cushions, enough for all guests, are stored on board the mother vessels. These must be placed in skiffs before guests board in order to provide both comfort and additional safety.

Skiff & Kayak Safety

Only USCG licensed guides are authorized to operate skiffs with guests onboard. Guests are not authorized to operate skiffs. Guides shall not load skiffs beyond their fixed capacities of 7 persons total. All skiff passengers must remain seated when operating skiffs at high speed and while landing, docking, or coming alongside. Two types of guest kayaking activities may be provided: near-vessel kayaking, and guided kayaking. Near-vessel kayakers stay within sight of the mother vessel and may be given general instructions on basic paddling safety according to a guest's individual experience. Guests are instructed to signal with a raised-paddle when in need of assistance. A kayak watch shall be maintained at all times on the mother vessel when near-vessel kayaking activities are taking place. Guided kayaking activities, on the other hand, may take place out-of-sight of mother vessels so long as a guide with a hand-held radio is among the paddlers. In all instances when paddlers are out on the water, a skiff shall be tied alongside the mother vessel and kept at-the-ready for dispatch in case of emergency.

Swimming Safety

Swimming is not allowed off mother vessels where the depth of water is often greater than 100 feet. Swimming activities may be provided by first guiding guests to shore in a skiff. Once on shore, shallow-water entry and exit is made possible for swimmers.

Shore & Fishing Excursion Safety Guidelines

Guides must not allow anyone in their shore excursion groups, including themselves, to take unnecessary risks. Steep and slippery terrain can be found nearly anywhere in Southeast Alaska, but vertical drop-offs can and must be avoided. Excessive risk-taking on shore by any crew member may constitute grounds for immediate dismissal. Guests are advised about paralytic shellfish poisoning and do not consume food onshore except for snacks or meals prepared on board the motherships.

Emergency and Evacuation Procedures

Emergency evacuation of one or more individuals in a shore party requires that the party make every effort to return to the mother vessel. If the severity of the emergency prevents returning to the vessel, then the maintenance of VHF communications between the shore party and the mother vessel becomes a priority.


Mother vessels have the communications equipment necessary for mobilizing outside rescue response units or medical assistance at the discretion of the Captain. Should one or more members of a shore party be deemed by the Captain to be in need of outside assistance, action shall be taken similar to that in case of a shipboard evacuation emergency, but with response units being directed to the site on shore by the Captain on board the mother vessel. Immediately upon initiating emergency evacuation procedures of any kind, the Captain shall, as soon as possible, contact senior company officials via sat-phone to report the emergency.



- 1. Every effort will be made to avoid close contact with bears. Firearms will be carried by guides only to provide adequate protection and noise making ability with bears. All guests are briefed on general safety, bear safety procedures and gun safety through pre-trip information, post arrival briefings and before shoreline and stream landings.
- 2. The hazards of every trip will be made known to every participant. Prospective clients will be screened to insure that they are qualified to make the trip in question.
- 3. All participants will be given specific instructions concerning boat handling and safety procedures. No one will be permitted to depart until everyone in the party is ready and orientated with a pre-trip safety talk. All members of the group will be accounted for at all times.
- 4. All members of the party, including the outfitter and employees will wear an approved floatation device when ever they are in the open skiffs & Rafts. All charter boats have labeled easy excess able lockers for storage of Type I life jacket for all passengers on board.
- 5. A procedure for the evacuation of a seriously injured person will be established, and made known to all employees. Sitka USCG rescue station and Helicopters are near by & are monitored on VHF Channel 16; 24 hour a day. Guest will also be briefed on our Lost and overdue client procedures and emergency and evacuation procedures.
- 6. If onsite water is to be used, measures will be taken to prevent contamination or pollution of such supplies. Unless tested, water will be treated, pumped through our industrial filter located at the source of our domestic water line. Bottled water & use of portable water filters on outings.
- 7. Sanitation in food handling is an important safety consideration and will be given continuous attention in the accordance with State & Federal health Codes.
- 8. Gas or butane stoves will be maintained in accordance will local ordinances and Underwriter's Laboratories standards.
- 9. All verbal contact with natives and other user groups will be conducted by Head Guide. All guests will be instructed to let the Head Guide handle any conflict with other outfitters or natives. Prerequisites & Training

A Baranof Wilderness Lodge Guide job is a very demanding job. The work starts will 5:00 morning coffee and doesn't stop until the last dinner dish is washed. Due to Alaska's sometimes adverse climate and conditions, a Baranof Wilderness Lodge Guide must have a positive attitude that will keep a high moral with the guests. To have a broad knowledge of the wildlife, birds, fish and flora of the SE Alaska and other Parks and to have an understanding of their habitats, migration patterns, feeding habits and growth cycles. 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
